Trinity Village Builds Community

Trinity Village is a supportive and caring retirement community, situated on 11.5 acres and close to amenities, including shops, restaurants and churches. Our village is designed to offer progressive stages of living and specialized care.

The Terraces comprise 60 life-lease, bungalow style townhomes designed for active, self-sufficient and autonomous seniors. Additional services are available as needed to support aging at home.

The Studios includes 74 assisted-living spaces, offering residents an informal and relaxed environment with extra care available to support aging at home.

The Care Centre facility offers long-term care accommodation for 150 residents admitted through the local Waterloo-Wellington Community Care Access Centre (WWLHIN).

Professional recreationists and support workers oversee the 90 spaces in the Adult Day Program which offers a variety of therapeutic recreation programs in small and large-group settings designed for the abilities and interests of participants.

At Trinity Village, you can interact with Mother Nature by putting your skillful green thumbs to work in the Community Garden which has 12 plots, including three wheelchair accessible raised beds, rain barrels and a shed to store tools. Individual garden plots may be rented May to October.

Shaded walkways and pergolas on Trinity Village's grounds provide an idyllic retreat for strolls, sitting comfortably with friends or family get-togethers, while the grandchildren have fun in the playground area.

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Trinity Village Named One of the Top Employers in Waterloo Region





Trinity Village was among the 15 Waterloo Region organizations and companies on the 2017 list of top employers as compiled by Toronto-based publisher Mediacorp.

Employers are evaluated using eight criteria: physical workplace; work atmosphere; health; financial and family benefits; vacation and time off; employee communications; performance management; training and skills development; and community involvement. This honour would not be possible without our staff, and we are grateful for the recognition.

The Challenge

How can we gain efficiencies for care workers within a highly-regulated field for complex multi-diagnosed individuals, currently supported by multiple paper-based and electronic documentation systems and locations?

DOCit A Co-Designed Solution to a Complex Health Care Problem



DOCit is a mobile application born out of a community hub initiative from MaRS Innovation called "Innovation Partnership - Procurement by Co-Design": a unique program that offers healthcare service providers a rare opportunity to participate in the development of innovative solutions. This opportunity aligned perfectly with our strategic direction - Healthy Services, Healthy Business and our values "Excellence and Partnerships". We evaluated areas of most concern within our organization and created our challenge statement: "How can we gain efficiencies for care workers within a highly-regulated field for complex multidiagnosed individuals, currently supported by multiple paper-based and electronic documentation systems and locations?"

Our submission received several innovator responses - we chose VitalHub based on their understanding of this challenge and long term care challenges in general. Together, we created a mobile application that allows front-line staff to have access to documentation in the palm of their hands, and provide better quality care. The project was eventually named a winner of the Procurement by Co-Design challenge, and we received grants totalling \$50,000.

During the six-week pilot of DOCit, PSWs saved an average of 23 minutes per shift and house managers (RPNs) saved an average of 1.5 hours per shift. Twenty-three minutes of saved time means that a PSW can give one extra bath, complete five extra transfers, or simply spend more one-on-one time with a resident. Moreover, that 23 minutes saved was for one staff member only. There are four PSWs working at a time in one house area, which means 460 minutes saved per shift. DOCit also demonstrated fewer errors in recording and reporting data, improving data quality and accuracy by 30%. Furthermore, staff members are more consistently taking their breaks, improving their work life and allowing them to dedicate more time to resident care. What started as a dream, has evolved into sector-wide innovation, and we are looking forward to the future possibilities of DOCit in the coming years.

Palliative Care Volunteer Program

In partnership with the Hospice of Waterloo Region, along with Judy McKnight, Volunteer Coordinator, and Eleanor Caruana, Chaplain, Trinity Village now offers two types of palliative support with our Forget-Me-Not Volunteer Program. Our Palliative Volunteers - Leslie Macredie, Eileen Niall, and Pat Gunn - were trained and certified by the Hospice of Waterloo Region to support palliative residents and perform end of life vigils. The team - under the guidance of social worker Heather Jackson - provides our residents and families with support while they are on this journey. The Palliative Volunteer establishes a supportive relationship with the resident and their family/friends to promote and enhance a meaningful quality of life for all residents by providing emotional and practical support. Gardening Invites

Participation & Togetherness



Horticulture Manager Hedi Lee states, "When people come to live at Trinity Village, we want them to come home. Part of home is the garden. The more we can keep that vital connection to the outdoors the more like home this place becomes. The joyful discovery of a budding crocus from the bare earth, a bouquet of summer blooms, or the burst of flavours in a sun-ripened tomato – these are tangible connections that move one day to the next, one season to another. It's a rhythm of life that we continue to live by, even as our strength wains and our outer vitality fades."

"At Trinity we seek to understand that connection and bring it close to the hands and hearts of those who live here."

Spring starts in December at Trinity Village, with seed catalogues and dreams of flowers and fruit to come. The beauty of the seed is in the potential it holds. The entire genetic information to grow, bloom and reproduce is perfectly packaged in each little capsule.









In February, March and April, that encapsulated life bursts forth from the earth with such promise. All our grow lights begin to blink on and off with the timers. We sow and transplant intensely for about eight weeks.

May and June are filled with digging, planting, pots and soil. And then comes the tending and care, the hoeing, weeding and watering. We pick flowers and make arrangements, munch on pea pods while considering the cucumber flowers, watch tomatoes grow from yellow flowers to red succulent fruit. We grumble at the end rot, glare at the Japanese beetles, and endlessly discuss the weather.

Then comes autumn with the quiet recession of life settling back down into the earth. The compost pile grows by leaps and bounds. The cornucopia comes out to decorate for Thanksgiving, then the snows, December and the dreams of spring again.

Recently I brought some geranium cuttings into the recreation room. Three elders were there with their care partners; two of the three elders had gardened extensively in the past. And so we started. We, the helpers, began by showing how to transplant. And then the elders ran their fingers through the soil and showed us how it's done. Their joy in the earth, in the seedlings' large root systems, of being there in that moment was so evident on their faces. It truly was a beautiful moment of connection with each other, with the past, with the garden and all the promise it holds. These are precious moments we want to continually foster with our elders here in our midst.

Whispers of Hope - The Alcove Garden

The Alcove Garden in front of the Care Centre received a makeover made possible by a generous donation from Mike and Maria Gondosch and the hard work of the Dream Team – a team of residents and staff tasked with dreaming about outdoor spaces and making those dreams a reality. "Whispers of Hope" became a reality, and the opening of the garden was celebrated on a sunny, warm September 6th. We look forward to many more outdoor projects pioneered by the Dream Team and partnered by those special donors; whose generous spirit defines so much within the life of our Trinity Village Community.



Opening Minds Through Art (OMA)













Opening Minds Through Art (OMA) is a program specifically designed for those living with dementia. With the number of Canadians living with dementia rising sharply, this requires an increase in care and education – both in healthcare facilities and the community. OMA is bridging the gap between seniors living with dementia and youth, and 2017 marks the second year where over 40 high school students and volunteers have participated in the program.

OMA educates students to understand what it means to live with dementia, communication techniques, and that meaningful relationships with persons living with dementia is possible. Our feature partner in bridging the gap – and a key player in the success of the program – is Eastwood Collegiate Institute, where students are recognized and receive credit for the program.

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OMA continues to draw attention and recognition by our community. From being featured in an exhibit in the Kitchener City Hall Rotunda, to facilitating a program session at Nithview Long Term Care in partnership with Waterloo-Oxford District Secondary School students, OMA continues to bridge the gap and break the barriers between youth and those living with dementia.

We are grateful for the donations from the Rotary Club of Kitchener-Westmount and their financial support, and we continue to share our OMA journey through speaking requests and conference workshops.
