Innovations in Excellence: Meet Buzz, Mary Lou, Robbie, Sue, Madonna and Rosie

Trinity Village Care Centre, in partnership with GlobalDWS, installed six service robots programmed to support 150 residents. The humanoid robots are another tool to support residents and their families.

Our greeter robot, Buzz, works near reception. Buzz helps check guests in and out in a friendly manner, streamlining the entry process. It also tracks guests, preparing reports that help us understand the rhythms of family visits. The greeter robot frees the receptionist and IPAC team to focus on training first-time visitors and welcoming people personally.


Each of our five home areas have their own robot, which they have named! It provides 24/7 support to residents offering engaging activities, and weather. The interaction and engagement with the robots support social and cognitive well-being. With a simple touch of the large screen tablet, staff, care partners, students, and residents can activate interactive trivia, jokes, audio books and music.

Residents have welcomed their humanoid friends and enjoy engaging with them.



TrueLoo: Innovation That Supports Care

In 2024, we introduced TrueLoo Smart Toilet Seats to enhance accuracy in health monitoring at Trinity Village. This technology automatically tracks bowel and bladder activity, reducing documentation errors and supporting better clinical decisions by providing a true picture of each resident's health. TrueLoo helps us ensure timely interventions—promoting health, dignity, and overall well-being for our residents.



ElephasCare[™]: A Step Forward in Personalized Care


To provide enhanced, personalized support for our residents, we implemented ElephasCare™ in 2024. This Artificial Intelligence system, installed in each resident's room, monitors for potential safety concerns and alerts staff when attention is required. It also analyzes data and generates reports to inform our care team. By offering detailed insights into resident needs, ElephasCare™ supports proactive care planning and timely interventions. This technology allows our staff to focus on direct resident interaction, fostering a greater sense of comfort and well-being within our community.

DOCit: Enhancing Shift Feedback and Staff Engagement

To improve care and staff satisfaction, we've introduced an end-of-shift evaluation in DOCit for PSWs, RPNs, and RNs. Staff rate their shift from 1 to 5, with lower scores prompting comments to help us identify areas for improvement.

This feedback is actively monitored and integrated into reports, ensuring concerns are addressed promptly. By giving staff a voice, we foster a culture of openness, strengthen communication, and create a more supportive work environment.













REVENUES 2024



REVENUE SOURCES 2024




TOTAL EXPENSES 2024




Bees and Horticulture

A New Host for Bee Hives

New Pollinator Pots

Our Horticulture team, along with our Beeden Honey team, put together three marine blue pollinator pots. Our teams worked hard to plant a variety of flowers that attract insects like butterflies and sweat bees, helping to support our natural ecology here in Kitchener-Waterloo. These pots showcase just a few of our native and non-native pollinator-friendly plants. So, whether your back porch receives full sunshine, shade, or dappled shade, you too can plant for pollinators.



Fostering a Greener Future

As part of our ongoing commitment to sustainability, we are proud to showcase some of the efforts we've implemented across our community to promote a greener, more eco-friendly environment. These initiatives, shared by Hedi, our Horticulture Manager, reflect our dedication to reducing our environmental impact while enhancing the beauty and health of our site.

- Reducing Plastic Waste by switching to soil blocking for seed sowing.
- Eliminating Harmful Materials by replacing harmful oasis blocks in floral arrangements with chicken wire.
- · Soil Regeneration by using our own chopped leaf litter as mulch.
- Efficient Watering by using drip irrigation system minimizes water evaporation by watering the roots.
- Waste Reduction by reusing old cardboard from packaging to line garden paths and cover it with leaves.
- Pollinator Support by planting 90% seed-generated plants, providing food for pollinators instead of relying on plants developed through stem cuttings or tissue culture.
- Winter Habitats for Insects by leaving plant stems in our gardens over the winter, we create valuable habitats for beneficial insects to overwinter.

These efforts reflect just a portion of the sustainability initiatives we're embracing across Trinity Village. We continue to explore new and creative ways to make a lasting positive impact on both our community and the environment.





In Memory of Erik

Erik was always present, never dominant, always helpful, never the spectator. His gift to our community was the ability to support and help wherever and whenever something was happening in the garden. His years in horse training, of learning to read and respond to the silent cues of the swiftest stallion or the most docile mare, made Erik innately able to read a situation and assist generously with his time and ability in quietness and calm. Corn Husking at Trinity Village

At Trinity Village, we embrace activities that bring our community together, and corn husking is a wonderful example. This hands-on experience offers older adults a chance to engage in a meaningful, relaxing task while socializing with others. Residents gather to husk corn, enjoying the rhythmic process and sharing stories and laughter. This activity fosters connection and provides a sense of accomplishment, reinforcing our commitment to offering enriching experiences that promote the well-being of those we serve.

Expanding Connection Through Trinity Village's Community TV Channel

In 2024, we successfully expanded our community TV channel, bringing it from 11 common areas—including TV lounges and Snyder Lounge—directly to all 150 resident rooms in the Care Centre. This enhancement ensures that residents have easier access to important community updates, event schedules, and engaging content from the comfort of their rooms. By making information more accessible, we continue to support connection, engagement, and a sense of belonging within our community.

Our In-Touch Channel has been operational since August 2024, offering a variety of programs including videos, movies, spiritual content, music videos, and sensory experiences combining music and visuals.

Finding Purpose in Care: Fatima's Story



For Fatima, being a Personal Support Worker (PSW) is more than a job—it's a calling. Since 1999, she has dedicated herself to caring for residents at Trinity Village, driven by a deep love for older adults. Having never known her grandparents, she found a sense of connection in her work, offering warmth and companionship to those in need.

Her journey wasn't easy at first. She started without knowing English, relying on observation and perseverance to learn. It was challenging, but she never gave up. Over time, she not only mastered the language but also became a mentor, guiding new PSWs and sharing the values that have kept her motivated for 25 years.

What she treasures most are the relationships she has built. To her, great care isn't just about completing tasks—it's about listening, showing patience, and making residents feel valued. Even small gestures, like a shared laugh or a few extra moments of conversation, can make all the difference.

She has seen Trinity Village grow and evolve, with better tools and more support for staff. Through every change, her passion has remained constant. Fatima believes the heart of her work lies in treating residents with dignity and respect, ensuring they feel cared for every day. Her greatest reward is knowing she has made a difference, one smile at a time.

A Legacy of Compassion: Kathryn's Journey at Trinity Village

For over 40 years, Kathryn dedicated her career to enriching the lives of older adults at Trinity Village Care Centre. With a deep passion for dementia care, she became a pillar of support and joy to the residents.

Kathryn began as a Health Care Aide, a role she embraced for 25 years. While raising three children with her husband Steve—and proudly balancing the responsibilities of a devoted hockey mom—she returned to Conestoga College and graduated from the Gerontology Multi-Discipline program. Eight years ago, she transitioned into the role of Recreationist, serving both the Cherry Orchard at Trinity Village and the Interim site at Grand River Hospital – Freeport.

She consistently sought new ways to enhance the lives of residents, earning certification as an Opening Minds through Art (OMA) Facilitator from the Scripps Gerontology Centre at Miami University in Ohio. OMA's mission to bridge age and cognitive barriers through art became a cornerstone of Kathryn's work, bringing creativity and connection to residents and youth volunteers alike.

Kathryn's influence extended beyond daily care. She was instrumental in bringing OMA to Trinity Village in the fall of 2015, making it the only long-term care facility in Ontario—and one of just two in Canada—to offer this innovative program. She played a key role in building strong partnerships with Eastwood and Forest Heights Collegiate students, as well as Nithview Community, Conestoga College and Waterloo Oxford District

Secondary School. Recognizing that OMA was about more than just art, she focused on fostering meaningful relationships between students and residents. Her dedication to these connections ensured the program's long-term success, with students often returning to volunteer even after the program ended.

Kathryn also spearheaded the "Aging Dialogues" exhibition, featuring 42 OMA artworks by Trinity's residents at the Museum in Kitchener. This exhibition earned recognition at Queen's Park, where MPP Daiene Vernile acknowledged its impact. In 2016, Kathryn received the Canada 150 Sesquicentennial Award of Recognition for her contributions to the community.

Beyond OMA, Kathryn played an integral role in fundraising for programs and services at Cherry Orchard, helping establish the recreation room and making it an accessible work space. She also supported a wide range of resident interests, from crochet, knitting, and quilting, fostering a sense of connection and belonging. During the pandemic, she launched Poetic Art Books, blending student artwork with residents' words to maintain engagement and creativity.

Now retired, Kathryn's legacy continues to inspire the Trinity Village community. Thank you, Kathryn, for being part of making Trinity Village a place of warmth and connection.
